### A BRIEF HISTORY OF HH&CGS

If not for the war years, on August 20<sup>th</sup> 2011 Hurst Horticultural & Cottage Garden Society would be celebrating its one hundred and nineth Annual Show. During the first and second World Wars however, events were held to help the war effort and usually referred to as the "Dig for Victory" shows.

The Society was founded in 1902 in Hurst Girls School under the patronage of Mr P H Martineau who lived in Hurst Lodge. He was elected President, and among the five vice Presidents elected was Rev E Broome, then vicar of Hurst. The first show was held on Wednesday July 30<sup>th</sup> 1902 in Mr Salter Chalker's meadow. The 1903 and 1904 shows were held in the grounds of Hurst Lodge, the fourth in 1905 at Haines Hill. The venue changed again in 1906 and 1907 to Hurst Grove. From 1928 the show was held on August Bank Holiday Monday at Hatch Gate Farm and billed as Berkshires Greatest Holiday Show until 1982. Signs of decline were creeping in due to the retirement of some Committee Members and the rising cost of tent hire, so for the first time in 71 years the show did not go on in 1983. After a years break 1984 was the final Big Show making a loss of £2138. A few members agreed to stay on the committee and voted to continue to organise a smaller show. Hurst Village Hall became the new home of a much scaled down event in 1985.

Still appealing to exhibitors including gardeners, jam makers and cooks but without the thousands of visitors who came to watch Wrestling Tournaments, see mounted displays by the Royal Scots Greys, 8<sup>th</sup> Hussars and Bronco Riders to name but a few. The Dale Martin Wrestling Tournament began in 1951 with a cost of £80, the wrestling matches continued to attract the crowds for 31 years until 1982. The Hurst based Pelham's Dodgems, Roundabouts and Fun Fair appeared at every show from 1934 donating a percentage of their day's takings which started at £15 in 1934 rising to £110 in 1984.

For a period of sixty three years from 1902 to 1965 the title "Hurst Horticultural and Cottage Garden Society" was used, when the committee voted for a shortened version and dropped the Cottage Garden Society. In 1992 many of the current members wished to revert to the full title.

Since 1985 the show is regularly held on the last Saturday before August Bank Holiday at the Village Hall and continues to thrive. The schedule is reviewed to keep a pace with modern trends but also keep traditional classes alive.

If you would like to find out more there are many fascinating facts presented in a recently produced colour booklet covering 100 years of the Shows history on sale at the 2011 show on Saturday 20<sup>th</sup> August.

### **Rules, Regulations & Conditions of Entry**

- 1 Classes in this Schedule are open to individual exhibitors, resident in any district, except where specified in the schedule. All entries to be exhibitor's own work; craft items must not have been previously exhibited in this show. **Joint entries will not be allowed.**
- Exhibits must be staged between 7.00am and 10.30am on the day of the show, and all competitors must vacate the show areas by 10.30am when judging will commence. Exhibits must be left until 4.00pm when they should be collected. Any items not collected before 4.30pm will be auctioned, starting at approximately 4.45pm unless clearly marked "NOT FOR SALE".
- 3 No responsibility can be accepted for any loss that may occur. Committee members will supervise the removal of exhibits prior to the auction, after which the show areas may be unattended. Any complaint should be raised before 3.00pm on the day of the show to a committee member.
- 4 No exhibit may carry any name or mark of identity and all foodstuffs must be covered.
- Vases for Horticultural flower classes will be supplied **and these must be used**. Exhibitors must provide their own dishes and bowls.
- Each exhibitor shall pay a fee for each entry in any class up to ten entries; further entries are free. Exhibitors are asked to make any cheques in payment of entry fees to HH & CGS.
- Any person exhibiting produce not of their own growing, or which has not been in their possession two months previous to the show, will forfeit all prizes and shall not be allowed to compete in future shows.
- 8 A judge may not enter a class that he/she is judging.
- 9 Only one entry per class per exhibitor.
- The closing date for entries is the Wednesday prior to the show (17th August 2011). If insufficient entries are received by the closing date, classes may be cancelled at the organisers' discretion.
- All competitors will be charged for admission to the show. (£2 adults, £1 OAPs & children).
- All awards will be handed out between 3.00pm and 3.30pm on the day of the show, at the show-ground.

### Rules, Regulations continued

- Points awarded shall be 4, 3 & 2 for all classes except those in **Bold Type**, which receive 6, 4 & 3. Additional prizes, if awarded, will carry proportionate points and, in the event of a tie, most firsts will decide.
- Hurst Horticultural Society is affiliated to the Royal Horticultural Society and the exhibits will be judged under RHS rules, unless otherwise stated in the schedule.
- This Society shall be called HURST HORTICULTURAL & COTTAGE GARDEN SOCIETY and shall have for its object the promotion of Horticulture.
- The Society shall be conducted by a President, Treasurer, Secretary and a Committee of not less than 14, with power to add to their number, 5 to form a quorum. The President, Treasurer and Secretary to be ex-officio members of the Committee. All of the Committee shall retire each year, but shall be eligible for re-election at the AGM.

### Recipe for Class 87 - Fruit Loaf with Lime and Ginger

**Cake:** 175g self-raising flour, 100g softened butter, 100g caster sugar, 3 eggs - beaten, 50g raisins, 50g glacé cherries, 150g sultanas, 4 bulbs stem ginger - chopped, Zest of 2 limes - finely grated.

**Icing:** 100g icing sugar, 2 tbsp. lime juice, 1 bulb stem ginger—chopped, Zest of 1 lime.

Preheat oven to 160 degrees C / Gas Mark 3. Grease and base line a 900g loaf tin. Measure all cake ingredients into a bowl and mix well. Pour into tin and bake for 50-60 minutes until golden and cooked through. For icing mix sugar and lime juice and spread over top of cake. Garnish with ginger and lemon zest.
